#### **Decisions**

The Transportation Planning and Programming Committee voted to take the following actions:

- elect MAPC, represented by Eric Bourassa, as vice chair of the Transportation Planning and Programming Committee
- approve the minutes of the meeting of May 14 and the minutes of the Municipal TIP Day meetings of May 21 and 28

#### Meeting Agenda

#### 1. Public Comments

Judy LaRocca, Town of Concord, Bruce Freeman Rail Trail Advisory Council, spoke in support of the Bruce Freeman Rail Trail project and requested that the MPO program the project in the FFYs 2010-2013 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). She stated that the Town of Concord is ready to go with the project, which is at 25% design. The town has received comments from MassHighway on the 25% design and a 25% design hearing has been scheduled. She stated that the project has the support of the Concord Board of Selectmen and Conservation Commission. She also added that the project fits in well with other projects, may help increase ridership on the Fitchburg commuter rail line and alleviate congestion on Route 2, and that it aligns with the town's Safe Routes to School program.

John Woodsmall, Town of Southborough, requested that the MPO consider programming Southborough's Main Street reconstruction project in the FFYs 2010-2013 TIP. The town expects to respond to MassHighway's comments on the project's 25% design by autumn. Both the town and the MassHighway District Office believe that the project can be ready for construction in 2011, he said. He also noted that the project has strong community support and addresses an important commuter corridor. Further, the design includes many recommendations from the MPO's *Pedestrian and Bicycle Improvements in Town Centers* study.

Wig Zamore, Somerville Transportation Equity Partnership/Mystic View Task Force, provided information to members regarding the planned Assembly Square Orange Line station as a follow up to questions that arose at the June 4<sup>th</sup> meeting. At that meeting, he advocated for changing the project design to include two entrances to the station rather than one. He distributed two handouts (see attached). One showed the size of the Assembly Square development as being the same distance as North Station is from South Station. The other showed the building layout for the development. W. Zamore noted that if there were one entrance in the center of the Orange Line platform transit riders would arrive at the back of the buildings, rather than at cross streets. He again advocated for two entrances at the ends of the platform.

#### 2. Chair's Report – David Mohler, EOT

The MPO elections have been held. The Town of Braintree was elected to the seat previously held by the City of Salem, and the Town of Bedford won re-election.

Members were asked to sign a form endorsing their April decision to specify the Federal Functional Classification of several roadways in Somerville – Assembly Square Drive, New Road, Foley Street, G Street, IKEA Way, and Lombardi Street – as "collectors."

Eric Bourassa, Metropolitan Area Planning Council, asked if EOT has developed a schedule for amending the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP). He remarked upon the

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interest some legislators have expressed on the transportation finance issue. D. Mohler stated that EOT is working on developing a schedule and that he expects that EOT will have a finance plan in July. Mary Pratt, Town of Hopkinton, suggested that the legislators refer to the Transportation Finance Commission Report.

Paul Regan, MBTA Advisory Board, asked for information on the status of the conversation about the finance plan issue at EOT and whether EOT is waiting for the resolution on the state transportation reform bill before producing the finance plan. D. Mohler replied that EOT is assessing how much money is available and what are the priorities. He indicated that the development of the finance plan is not tied to the bill, but that a challenge will be how to address the \$160 million gap in the MBTA's finances.

David Koses, City of Newton, inquired about the deadline for amending the RTP in order that the current TIP does not become invalid. D. Mohler stated that the deadline is October 1<sup>st</sup>.

M. Pratt stated that the Central Artery/Tunnel project should be a separate bonded item and not placed as a burden on the Massachusetts Turnpike Authority and MBTA.

# **3.** Subcommittee Chairs' Reports – Jim Gallagher, MAPC, and Paul Regan, MBTA Advisory Board

The Suburban Mobility/Transportation Demand Management (TDM) Subcommittee will meet this afternoon and make recommendations on proposals. The Subcommittee will bring those recommendations to the Committee on June 18<sup>th</sup>.

The Administration and Finance Subcommittee will meet on June 18th at 9AM.

#### 4. Regional Transportation Advisory Council – Laura Wiener, Regional

#### Transportation Advisory Council

The Advisory Council met on June 10<sup>th</sup>. The meeting included a presentation about the MBTA's Program for Mass Transit and a discussion on the status of the TIP and Unified

Planning Work Program (UPWP). Next month the Council will be developing comments on the TIP and UPWP. In August, the Council will have a presentation on the Accelerated Bridge Program. Secretary Aloisi is scheduled to attend a meeting in September.

5. Director's Report – Arnie Soolman, Director, Central Transportation Planning Staff (CTPS)

CTPS is working on its budget. There will likely be an excess of about \$400,000 in 3C Planning funds available for new studies. This will be discussed in more detail in the UPWP Subcommittee meeting next week.

M. Pratt indicated that she was pleased to see the Town of Southborough bring its Main Street reconstruction project to the MPO as this project has elements recommended from the UPWP study, *Pedestrian and Bicycle Improvements in Town Centers*.

#### **6.** Election of Vice Chair – David Mohler, EOT

A motion to elect MAPC, represented by Eric Bourassa, as vice chair of the Transportation Planning and Programming Committee was made by Richard Reed, Town of Bedford, and seconded by M. Pratt. The motion passed unanimously.

#### 7. Meeting Minutes -- Pam Wolfe, Manager of Certification Activities, CTPS

A motion to approve the minutes of the meeting of May 14 was made by P. Regan, and seconded by Ginger Esty, Town of Framingham. The motion passed unanimously.

A motion to approve the minutes of the Municipal TIP Days meetings of May 21 and 28 was made by P. Regan, and seconded by G. Esty. The motion passed. R. Reed abstained.

### 8. Staff Recommendation – Highway Projects, FFYs 2010 – 2013 Transportation Improvement Program and Amendment 4 of the FFY 2009 Element of the FFYs 2007 – 2010 TIP – Hayes Morrison, TIP Manager, MPO Staff

#### Amendment 4 of the FFY 2009 Element of the FFYs 2007 – 2010 TIP

Staff distributed draft TIP tables for Amendment 4 of the FFY 2009 Element of the FFYs 2007 – 2010 TIP and a handout showing changes to the transit element for members to review prior to discussion at a future meeting. (See attached.)

J. Gallagher asked about the status of the *Arlington – Cyrus Dallin or Thompson or Stratton Elementary School(s) Sidewalk Improvements* project, which is programmed to receive American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) funding. H. Morrison replied that the Commonwealth had not informed her that there is a need to make an adjustment to the ARRA project list at this time. D. Mohler stated that some ARRA projects will not be advertised within the 120-day timeframe for expending stimulus funding.

J. Gallagher then asked if communities would be informed that their projects might not go forward. D. Mohler replied that communities would be informed during the development of the FFYs 2010 - 2013 TIP. He also stated that there will be a discussion about putting projects that were not advertised in time for the first round of stimulus funding on the TIP to receive funding for the second round of stimulus funding. Projects originally scheduled for the first round of funding could still be advertised this summer, before the start of FFY 2010.

M. Pratt suggested putting indicators on the TIP tables to show which projects are tentative for receiving ARRA funding. D. Mohler advised staff to put the advertising date next to the projects that have been advertised.

P. Regan discussed a project idea (for Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement Program funding) developed by Transit*Works*, a non-profit transportation research organization formed by A Better City and the MBTA Advisory Board. (See attached project description.) Transit*Works* gathers survey data on the preferences of transit riders. Transit*Works* is proposing to conduct a telephone survey of transit riders and people who do not use transit, and to expand the work of "Charlie Volunteers," who ride the MBTA and chronicle their journeys. The project would cost about \$50,000 and could begin as soon as possible. P. Regan noted that the project would provide valuable information to the MPO and make the MPO a leader in acquiring this type of survey data. He asked for the MPO's support for the project.

E. Bourassa stated that MAPC is finalizing a project list of municipal priorities for ARRA funding that it will share with staff. D. Mohler asked about how the list is being developed. J. Gallagher stated that MAPC has sent letters to municipalities requesting information on their priorities and considered information that municipalities supplied at the MPO's Municipal TIP Input Days.

#### FFYs 2010 - 2013 TIP

Members then discussed the TIP tables that show the staff recommendation for the FFYs 2010 – 2013 TIP. This document is intended to be the starting point for discussion for TIP development. H. Morrison noted that the tables are based on targets announced at the recent MARPA meeting. She then provided an overview of the changes noting where there were project cost changes, and projects removed or added.

#### FFY 2010 Element

Noting that the *Framingham* – *Central Street over the Sudbury River* bridge project was moved out of the FFY 2010 element, Ginger Esty, Town of Framingham, stated that the project is important for traffic flow. She also referenced another Framingham project – the *Danvers Street* bridge. H. Morrison stated that the *Central Street* project is still in the TIP having been moved to the FFY 2012 element. The *Danvers Street* project may be in the Accelerated Bridge Program, she said.

David Koses, City of Newton, requested that staff provide a list of projects that could be ready in the next couple of years and that are not included in the staff recommendation. H. Morrison noted that the universe of projects includes those for which federal funding has been requested (those projects in the TIP binder that members received for Municipal TIP Input Days) and that the universe is reflected in the project evaluation forms distributed to members of the committee at Municipal TIP Input Days. This evaluation matrix includes the design status and cost information for projects. D. Mohler asked staff to sort the evaluation forms by design status.

Richard Reed, Town of Bedford, suggested extending the timeframe for voting on the TIP to allow members more time to review the information available to them. Members agreed to take up Amendment 4 on June 18, and discuss the FFYs 2010 - 2013 TIP on July 2. Members were advised to plan to meet every week in July for the development of the TIP and the RTP amendment.

H. Morrison walked members through the TIP tables. (Changes are noted on the righthand side of the attached TIP tables. Where there were cost changes, the former cost is also noted on the right.)

Members raised the following questions and points:

J. Gallagher noted that due to the cost change for the *Bellingham – Pulaski Boulevard* project – to \$13 million – the project would have to be included in the RTP. (Projects costing over \$10 million must be listed in the RTP.)

D. Mohler asked what programs were included in the Regionwide CMAQ Program? H. Morrison stated that the category includes \$1.55 million for the Regional Bicycle Parking Program and the Suburban Mobility and TDM Programs, and an additional \$950,000 for other CMAQ projects to be selected by the committee.

D. Mohler asked if the FFY 2009 design funds for the Ipswich – North Green Improvements project had been obligated. H. Morrison stated that the design funds had not been obligated. Staff is working with EOT to ensure the obligation of funds in FFY 2010, she said. H. Morrison noted that the Special Bridge Funds category includes special funding Congress provided to states following the bridge collapse in Minnesota. These funds will be provided by FHWA in FFYs 2009 and 2010.

D. Mohler asked if all the highway projects (in the Federal Aid Target category) are likely to be ready for the year programmed. H. Morrison replied yes.

In reference to several High-Priority Project (HPP) earmarked projects for Boston (in the Federal Aid Non-Target category), D. Mohler noted that earmarked projects cannot be in the TIP unless they are ready to be constructed. He expressed concern that the *Huntington Avenue/Symphony Area Streetscape Construction, Melnea Cass Boulevard Construction, and Warren Street/Blue Hill Avenue* projects are not at the design stage that would enable construction within the TIP timeframe. Jim Gillooly, City of Boston, stated that he would do some research on the projects and work with staff within the next week.

D. Mohler asked if the HPP Walpole – Washington Street project was programmed for design or construction? H. Morrison stated that it is programmed for construction.

J. Gallagher raised the issue of the possible rescinding of unobligated HPP (TEA-21) funding, as a result of a provision included in a federal House bill. D. Mohler stated that, if the provision passes, and those earmarked projects are not advertised, the funding could be rescinded. Therefore, the placement of the *Boston – Huntington Avenue/Symphony Area Streetscape Construction* project in the TIP does not secure the funding for the project. J. Gillooly added that the full design of the project is underway and that, if the earmark is not eliminated by the federal legislation, the project will be ready for construction in FFY 2010.

Regarding two earmarks for Somerville projects, Thomas Bent, City of Somerville, noted that the *Somerville Community Path, Phase I* project is at 100% design, and the *Beacon Street* project is at 75%.

P. Regan asked about the *Woburn – Salem Street over MBTA* bridge project. H. Morrison stated that it was moved off the TIP.

J. Gallagher noted that the *Quincy Center Concourse* project would have to be added to the FFY 2010 element after the RTP is amended.

#### **FFY 2011 TIP**

H. Morrison noted that the Arlington, Somerville, Cambridge – Minuteman Bikeway Connector project is on the list for ARRA funding.

Funding for the *Concord & Lincoln – Route 2 (Crosby's Corner)* project begins to be programmed in the FFY 2011 element across three funding programs: CMAQ, Surface Transportation, and Highway Safety Improvement. Approximately \$19-20 million would be programmed each year from FFYs 2011 to 2013. (The total project cost estimate is approximately \$72 million.)

R. Reed inquired about the funding for right-of-way acquisition for the *Crosby's Corner* project. D. Mohler said he expects the acquisition will begin this fiscal year (this month) and go into the next fiscal year. It would be funded with state funds (under the state's non-federal aid bond cap). R. Reed then asked if it could be assured that the state could purchase the right-of-way given the current issues of balancing the state budget. D. Mohler replied that the state will be committed to purchasing all the right-of-way as soon as it makes the first land purchase. The first purchase is expected to occur by June 30.

M. Pratt noted that the total cost (federal and state dollars) for the *Crosby's Corner* project will be about \$100 million (including right-of-way acquisition). She also noted that the Town of Concord proposed an associated project at Municipal TIP Input Day that would address stormwater issues.

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H. Morrison noted that the *Needham*, *Wellesley – Route 128 Improvement Program* project is moving to FFY 2012 (roadway contract six, project number 603206), and the *Concord – Route 2* project is funded by ARRA.

J. Gallagher asked about when the entire *Route 128 Improvement Program* is expected to be finished. D. Mohler stated that he would find out.

#### **FFY 2012**

H. Morrison noted that the *Somerville – Magoun Square* project will be funded by ARRA.

J. Gallagher inquired about the funding in FFY 2011 being more than seemed to be previously available. H. Morrison replied that the difference was approximately \$2 million and she would check into the discrepancy.

Lourenço Dantas, Massport, stated that Massport will be requesting that the MPO program the *East Chelsea Bypass* project, which has a \$5 million earmark, in the FFY 2012 element. The project is in the RTP with an estimated cost of \$17 million. That figure will be revised to reflect both a current estimate and available outside funding.

Joe Cosgrove, MBTA, asked about the status of the *Longfellow Bridge* project. D. Mohler stated that the project is slated for FFY 2011 and will be in the Accelerated Bridge Program. In 2015 part of the funding for Accelerated Bridge Program will convert to Grant Anticipation Notes (GANS).

#### **FFY 2013**

Members further discussed the *Crosby's Corner* project. As programmed, the MPO would spend \$56 million in the FFYs 2010 – 2013 TIP for the \$72 million project, the remaining \$16 million that would need to be programmed in FFY 2014 element.

R. Reed asked about how the project is going to be executed and whether the construction sequence had been determined (for year-by-year construction funding needs). He asked if the figures in the TIP would have to be adjusted after the project is advertised to better reflect the construction spending and if there would then be flexibility to fund other projects.

D. Mohler stated that there would be one contract for the four-year project. The TIP shows the cash flow, but not based on the construction sequence. The TIP reflects an anticipated funding of approximately equal amounts over the anticipated construction timeline. In this case, the project is projected to take four years to construct. However, an attempt should be made to match the TIP figures to construction expectations, he said.

D. Koses asked why the *Hudson – Washington Street* project received priority in this element. H. Morrison stated that the project was prioritized based on safety, mobility and operations and cost issues. The location is a high crash area and the project design addresses the safety need. The project has also been in the RTP. The Town of Belmont also had a project that addressed safety, but the cost was too high to fit in this element.

Staff was asked to provide the following information to members:

- 2009 Draft TIP tables
- List of projects in the first five years of the RTP
- Index of projects in the draft FFY 2009 2012 TIP
- Project evaluations sorted by design status

Members agreed to further discuss the TIP on July 2. The MPO could then release the TIP to the public (though the formal public review period would not take place until the RTP amendment was also released for public review).

#### 9. Members Items

J. Gillooly remarked on the importance of coordinating various projects to repair bridges over the Charles River given that multiple agencies, cities, and organizations are involved (including MassHighway, Department of Conservation and Recreation, Cities of Boston and Cambridge, and business coalitions). D. Mohler noted that DCR controlled bridges that carry motor vehicles will be coming under the purview of MassHighway.

M. Pratt advocated for funding to repair the Long Island Bridge, which serves a hospital on the island.

R. Reed requested that staff provide a list of subcommittee assignments. D. Mohler stated that subcommittee assignments can be chosen, but must also reflect an even number of members on each committee. Members agreed to take this issue up again.
